Messages from our PA



Since I will be on vacation next week in Door County with my wife, children and grandkids, I will not have a column in next week's bulletin. So I'll take this opportunity to share my hopes that all of you have a safe, enjoyable summer with many blessed opportunities to delight in God's creation with family and friends!

In his recent Apostolic Exhortation, *Amoris Laetitia* (The Joy of Love), **Pope Francis reminds us of our perpetual call to evangelize**. He reminds us that **the core of the Gospel message, the kerygma**, "has to occupy the center of all evangelizing activity. It is the first and most important proclamation, which we must hear again and again in different ways, and which we must always announce in one form or another". Some of you may be asking, "Just exactly what is this *kerygma*?"

Kerygma is a Greek word used in the New Testament, literally meaning "**to cry or proclaim as a herald**". Merriam-Webster defines it as "**the apostolic proclamation of salvation through Jesus Christ**".

Probably the earliest record of one of the apostles making that proclamation is **Peter's speech on Pentecost**: "...hear these words. Jesus the Nazorean was a man commended to you by God with mighty deeds, wonders, and signs which God worked through him in your midst, ... This man, ... you killed, using lawless men to crucify him. But God raised him up, releasing him from the throes of death... God raised this Jesus; of this we are all witnesses... Therefore let the whole house of Israel know for certain that God has made him both Lord and Messiah, this Jesus whom you crucified." Acts 2:22-24, 32, 36.

One of the most familiar ways we proclaim the kerygma is when we sing the Eucharistic Acclamation in Mass: "**We proclaim your death, O Lord, and profess your Resurrection; until You come again!**" We need to encounter the death and resurrection of Jesus deep in our hearts and become his disciples so we can proclaim those realities of our faith with confidence to others, inviting them to follow Jesus as well!

Deacon Mike Rooney recently shared a book with me: **From Age to Age: How Christians Have Celebrated the Eucharist** by Edward Foley. I've only read the first chapter, titled "Emerging Christianity-the First Century", but already two important insights have emerged.

THE FIRST reaffirms a basic principle of celebrating good liturgies. When considering how the tradition of **Sacrifice** in the Jewish religious identity carries over into emerging Christianity, Foley writes: "**The Old Testament provides very clear guidelines regarding the physical aspects of sacrifice... Yet, it is clear in Jewish theology that the physical aspects alone... were not the central point of sacrifice; rather, ... The external rituals were to be a sign of an interior disposition of devotion to God.**" In contemporary church language, liturgists writing about the Mass would say that good liturgy **draws the assembly into active participation**. Not only are we engaged through good music, preaching, and environment, **but even more important is that our hearts and spirits are encountering the presence and power of Christ!**

THE SECOND insight was new and surprising for me. I'm sure that I don't understand the full significance of it yet. But I'll be pondering it each time I'm celebrating Eucharist in the future. Foley writes: "While the Israelites developed an idea of mutual love..., Christianity placed the love of neighbor at the very center of the gospel, equating it with the love of God. This new covenant of love was symbolized in a memorable way by Jesus in his table ministry. Time and again he was remembered as not only eating and drinking with ultimate outsiders—sinners—but also embracing them. And this same Jesus who reached out to Samaritan women, tax collectors, and outcasts of every kind ultimately himself became an outsider, rejected by many of his own people and executed as a criminal. In an ironic twist, the Gospel of Luke presents the resurrected Jesus as a stranger to his own disciples on the road to Emmaus... if the disciples had not invited the unrecognized Jesus to walk with them and to dine with them, there would have been no recognition in the breaking of the bread: **no Eucharist without the stranger.**"

A note from Brigitte Glinski, Parish Nurse

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day is June 15. This day has been recognized internationally since 2006. The goal of World Elder Abuse Awareness Day is to foster a wider global recognition of the existence of all forms of abuse against senior citizens. The ultimate goal is to eliminate the abuse of our elderly citizens. Elderly people can be very vulnerable to abuse, often at the hands of family members. There are several types of elder abuse. Some of the types of abuse are:

- Physical abuse occurs when an elderly person is physically hurt or injured by another person.
- Emotional abuse occurs when a person is treated in such a way that he feels anguish or emotional distress through either verbal or nonverbal acts. This can include humiliation, name-calling, intimidation, or threats.
- Sexual abuse means any non-consensual sexual contact.
- Neglect is the failure to provide adequate food, shelter, or medical care to a senior whom a person is responsible.
- Self-neglect is the failure of an elderly person to adequately care for himself to the extent that that person's health or safety is threatened.
- Financial abuse occurs when someone steals money, property, or assets from an elderly person.

Some signs of elder abuse include bruising, burns, broken bones, bedsores, weight loss, poor hygiene, frequent arguments with caregivers, threats or verbal abuse from the caregiver, and withdrawal from normal activities.

If you suspect that an elderly person is being abused, you should contact your local Police Department or contact the Adult Protective Services Unit in the Aging and Disability Resource Center at 262-548-7848.

St. James Community Garden

What comes to your mind when you think of mint? Perhaps you think of Mint Juleps, those iconic drinks famous in the South. Just the thought of enjoying this genteel refreshment on a balmy summer afternoon can make you smile. If that's what mint brings to your mind...we have news for you. This plant is anything but mild-mannered and genteel. For proof, all you have to do is look at our Field of Dreams garden. Last Saturday there were mint plants crowding the far fence line and encroaching on the space between the beds. The mint was thick, it was lush, it was at least a foot high and we didn't expect it there. Mint is invasive. It assumes that any open space is fair game and it moves in. Hardly what you might call mild-mannered.

We will do our best to get rid of it to leave room and nutrients for the veggies we've planted for the Food Pantry. To that end a boy scout troop will be pulling mint from the garden. It may be a bit of a boring job; they may get tired, but those boys will certainly smell good when they go home.

We are removing other weeds, putting up a pea trellis and adding tomato towers. All in the name of looking good and providing a bountiful harvest. But even our group of Master Gardeners can't control nature. Our spinach is showing signs of fungus. Maybe it was present in the ground when we planted; maybe it was encouraged by the wet spring we had. But that's how gardening grows; you do your best keeping in mind that there are no guarantees.

We are reaching the time of our season when we are looking for more volunteers. Contact Paul and ask him to put you on the mailing list. There is no obligation. You will get a weekly email explaining what will be happening at the garden on Saturday morning. If it fits your schedule, you can come, meet new friends and help in whatever way works for you. You will be very welcome.
