

2. Are you someone who left the family?
3. Are you someone who groveled your way back home?
4. Are you the parent who watched your child turn their back on you?
5. Are you the father who constantly watches for your child's return?
6. Are you the one who experiences jealousy and resentment?
7. Are you the older son who finds out, not from his family, but from a servant?
8. Have you ever thought about the mother in this family?
9. No matter where you are today or from where you have come, can you be as merciful and forgiving as the father?

This merciful and forgiving Father is our God today.

We are called to do the same.



Matthew 25 Year of Mercy

On Laetare Sunday, we rejoice as Luke's Jesus proclaims that God is boundlessly merciful. The parable's prodigal son returns home, not authentically repentant but desperate, having squandered on the inheritance wrongly demanded while his father still lived. This selfish son is only spared ritual "shaming" when the father "shames" himself, running to embrace him, interrupting his prepared "act of contrition." By doing so he challenges confessors, and all of us, to be signs, says Pope Francis, "of the primacy of mercy always, everywhere, and in every situation, no matter what." Avoid the harshness of the elder son, Francis warns, "who stands outside, incapable of rejoicing," his judgment "severe, unjust, and meaningless in light of the father's boundless mercy" (*Misericordiae Vultus*, 17). If John's Gospel is proclaimed, the "religiously observant" people there likewise serve to warn against harshly judging others, for the physical blindness of the man they expel from the synagogue is healed, while their own blindness of heart remains. —Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. ◆ How can we not be overwhelmed that no matter how far we stray or run away, our God is always on the lookout for us, eager to enfold us in His loving embrace, squeezing out of us all the hurt, the pain, the brokenness, the sin.

◆ Our Lenten planning group authored the reflective questions we heard today as the homily. These same questions are reprinted on the cover of today's bulletin. Let's turn to them throughout this 4th week of Lent, chewing on them, swallowing them, digesting them. We need to allow the healing mercy of God to so penetrate our lives, that the compassion of God is our DNA. We bask in the warm embrace of our Prodigal God. We absorb God's love to such an extent that it overflows through us and out of us into the lives of others and the world around us.

• Let's continue to use both our Leap of Faith items found in the sanctuary and the Matthew 25 items found on the Giving Tree by the Baptismal Font. These can provide the vehicle for the world to become an experience of the Kingdom of God by the end of Lent and well into the Easter Season.

• And I am most grateful for your lavish prayers this past year for my shoulder condition. April 13, 2015 was to be my left shoulder replacement surgery. Days before the doctor noticed my blood platelets were too low for surgery. We still don't know why my body destroys my platelets, but from a number of treatments, my platelets continue to be high enough for shoulder replacement.

My new surgery date is March 17.....St. Patrick Day! I'm hoping the anesthesia is a pint of Guinness! But alas, a new wrinkle! My pre-op physical included an EKG! Something isn't right with my heart! That's

greatly appreciated. (All I can think of at this point is a popular movie during my high school years: They Shoot Horses Don't They!)

A note from Brigitte Glinski, Parish Nurse

Are you aware that female heart attacks are different than male? The movies show a man having sudden pain in the chest, a cold sweat, grabbing at his chest and collapsing. That is just not how it typically happens for women. I was forwarded an email written by a woman describing her heart attack, and thought the following information was great.

Heart attack

The night of her heart attack, the woman was sitting comfortably on her lazy boy, she had not previously exerted herself, and she had had no emotional trauma. All of a sudden she felt a sensation of terrible indigestion, but she had not eaten for hours, the feeling that is common after eating in a hurry and drinking a bit of water to wash it down. But that bite feels like a golf ball sitting in your esophagus moving in slow motion. After the feeling of indigestion began to subside, she felt little squeezing motions moving up her spine that gained speed as they raced up under her breast bone. The squeezing motions continued up to her throat and branched out to both jaws. At this point she realized that she may be having a heart attack, jaw pain is a classic symptom. She called 911, and followed their instructions. Her symptoms took place over only 4-5 minutes, and the paramedics made it to her rather quickly, but she had lost consciousness before they arrived.

She goes on, in the email, to write about what happened at the hospital, and finishes the email with some tips, these follow:

- Be aware that something very different is happening in your body, not the usual men's symptoms but inexplicable things happening. It is said that many more women die of their first (and last) heart attack because they didn't know they were having one and commonly mistake it for indigestion, take some Maalox, and go to bed, never to wake up.
- Call the paramedics if anything is unpleasantly happening that you've not felt before, it is better to have a false alarm! Call the paramedics is key, DO NOT drive yourself to the ER, you are a danger on the roads. DO NOT have your panicked husband drive you; he will be a nervous wreck and a danger on the roads. DO NOT call your doctor, you don't have the time to wait for a call back, and he will probably just tell you to call 911 anyway.
- Don't assume it couldn't be a heart attack because you don't have a high cholesterol count. Research has shown that elevated cholesterol is rarely the cause of a heart attack; they are usually caused by long-term stress and inflammation.

Please share this information with friends, it is important that women know the difference between male and female heart attack symptoms.

Thank you to Natalie Horsch for forwarding me the email; this is a great description that could save a life!
