

The Franciscan Missions Yesterday and Today...



Our new Pope chose the name *FRANCIS* with reference to Francis of Assisi who loves the Poor and Inspiration in the promotion of Peace and Care for Creation. It is an invitation to rediscover Francis of Assisi who received from Jesus a command to Repair His church, and to go and proclaim the Gospel.

Inspired to live the Gospel and to follow the will of the Lord, Francis and his early followers became the first missionary congregation in the Church. In 1209, the Order of Friars Minor (OFM), known as the Franciscans, a Religious Congregation and Brotherhood of Priests and Lay Brothers came into existence.

For eight centuries the Catholic Faithful accompanied the Franciscans in their missionary works and activities through their fervent prayers and material support. At present the Franciscans are active in the missions in more than 100 countries.

healing, hope, peace, justice
and all that is good for the people.*

While responding to the spiritual hunger of the people, corporal necessities are also taken care of thru human development projects directed most specifically to the poor and the marginalized. The Leprosarium in Guinea Bissau and Burundi, the Formation of Missionaries in the Philippines, the orphanage in Ecuador, the program for children and youth in Africa, Asia and Latin America are included in the long list of beneficiaries. The pastoral

care for the Catholic minority in Sudan, Myanmar, Thailand, India, Papua New Guinea, Sri Lanka and Thailand in the midst of Buddhist and Muslim majority needs substantial support. Developing local vocations to the Franciscan Order in those countries is not possible without outside help.

St. Francis of Assisi was very grateful for the brothers that God gave him as fellow workers to fulfill the mission that Jesus inspired him to do. In the same way we in the GSFM thank God for you, our friends and fellow workers, in the Kingdom of God that He gives us. Thank you for being with us in the mission to continue the work that He entrusted to the Church throughout the world where we Franciscans are called to serve. The Lord Give You Peace!

Evangelization: The faithful discern Evangelization priorities



In the background paper, “*Evangelization*,” the author, Rich Harter, MTS, director, the Office of Evangelization, Archdiocese of Milwaukee – John Paul II Center says, “Evangelization is the action of proclaiming Jesus Christ ‘In the community of the Church.’ The New Evangelization recognizes that in order to bring people into an encounter with Jesus, we need to bring them into an encounter with the Church. In her Sacraments, teaching, and service, the Church acts as the incarnation of Christ in the present day. Referring to the Church, St. Paul says it succinctly: ‘Now you are Christ’s body, and individually parts of it’ (I Cor. 12: 27). The faith and conversion sought by evangelization always happen within the communal ecclesial context. Pope Francis reminds us, ‘By its very nature, faith is open to the ‘We’ of the Church; it always takes place within her communion’ (Lumen Fidei, Pope Francis, no. 39). In other words, the act of believing in Jesus requires belonging to Christ in his Body, the Church.”

Below are the top three priorities in Evangelization voted on at the Synod.

First Priority – 23% – Leadership Training Process

Implement a “Strategic Leadership Training Process” to train archdiocesan staff, seminarians, priests, deacons, school principals, parish staffs, and parish leaders in the vision, process, methods and skills of “Missionary Leadership for the New Evangelization.”

Second Priority – 22% – Catholic Identity Faith Formation

Implement a creative and strategic process in parishes and schools for building Catholic Identity and forming people and families in the essentials of the Catholic faith.

Third Priority – 21% – District Evangelization Councils

Create “District Evangelization Councils” for the sharing and implementation of best practices, and for networking people around common high-impact evangelization initiatives that reach active Catholics, lapsed Catholics, and unaffiliated seekers.

Other areas of evangelization such as technology, inner city training and increased resources at the archdiocese were discussed and discerned and will be taken into consideration as Archbishop ListECKI creates his Synodal Declaration. For more information, go to www.archmil.org/Synod2014.htm.

The next key mission area to be featured will be Formation – the fourth of eight areas discerned at the Synod. On September 14, Archbishop ListECKI will issue a Synodal Declaration, which will include the priorities set for the Archdiocese for the next 10-15 years. The information from the Synod will assist Archbishop ListECKI in his discernment process in creating this Declaration.

FIELDS OF HOPE & DREAMS COMMUNITY GARDENS

Last week our volunteers delivered our largest donation of vegetables to the Cooperating Churches of Sussex's (CCOS) food pantry this season/year. What continues to produce is the: lettuce, kale, Swiss chard, beans, peas, beets, chives and parsley – all the cool weather crops from our Field of Dreams (cool/shaded) garden. What's missing is the warm weather crops of: tomatoes, peppers, and cucumbers from our Field of Hope(hot/full sun) garden. These crops usually generate the most poundage for the food pantry. We have fruit on the vines but it's not turning color or ripening. And with the rain and humidity we're staying vigilant for disease. It seems like we're about a month behind most past seasons, which is where we started out in the spring of this year. We thankfully received large donations of zucchini, squash, cucumbers and herbs from some home gardens to combine with what was grown here at St. James. Donated vegetables appeared on the picnic tables outside the Christian Formation entrance near the cafeteria last Saturday morning. We can't be thankful enough. And the CCOS food pantry continues to tell us that our vegetables get selected first by clients since our produce is washed, dried, bagged in Ziploc bags, labeled and in some instances given a recipe for preparing. So if your home garden is producing more than you can eat, can, or dehydrate, think about dropping off some of your excess here at church, and stop by and visit with our volunteers and see what we're up to. We're in the gardens Saturday mornings from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. (weather permitting) and then deliver our donated produce to the CCOS food pantry before 10:30 a.m. when the pantry opens to clients. A Note from the Parish Nurse, Pam Dennis:

Now that summer is in full swing and everyone is outside with activities, I thought it would be a great time to talk to you about hot and cold therapies for injuries. Perhaps you overdid it playing in the yard with the grandkids over the weekend or you thought you could handle the touch football game with your teenagers but now you have a sore lower back. Should you reach for the heating pad or the ice pack? Heat and cold injuries are commonly used treatments for pain and injuries. Sometimes it is not always clear which to choose. Heat can help with pain in the form of a heating pad, warm compress, or a warm shower or bath. The heat works by increasing the blood flow to the area where you're experiencing pain. This helps relax tight or cramped muscles. Many people also find that heat helps with arthritis pain – when not accompanied by inflammation. To use heat as a therapy, apply for up to 15 minutes at a time, two or three times a day. To protect your skin from burns, avoid going too long or too hot with the heat, do not put directly on the skin (put over a shirt or pants) and avoid lying directly on the heat source. Another way to make a heat source is a rice sock. Take a long athletic sock and fill with rice and tie at the end. You can heat the sock in the microwave for 1-2 minutes and it is very flexible to place around your neck or another body part.



Remember that because hot therapy increases blood flow, it can actually aggravate an acute injury such as a sprain or strain by increasing the swelling. In these cases, use cold therapy instead of the hot therapy. For cold therapy, you may use an ice pack, a cool bath or even a bag of frozen vegetables (that's what we use in the Dennis house). Cold works best to treat the inflammation caused by more acute injuries such as sprains, strains and pulled muscles. The cold will help take the swelling down by constricting the blood vessels. Keep in mind the R.I.C.E. formula, that cold is part of for injuries. **R**est the injured area, **I**ce the affected area as soon as possible after the injury, **C**ompress, as with a bandage or elastic wrap, helps with swelling, and **E**levate the injured area above the heart level whenever possible to prevent and limit swelling. Apply cold for 15 – 20 minutes, four to eight times a day is the recommended procedure; for 48 hours or until swelling improves. Do not use too long at one time or it can cause tissue damage. Again, do not apply directly on the skin but wrap your ice pack in a protective layer, such as a towel or pillowcase.

There may be times when you would want to alternate heat and cold. Lower back pain is one area that a lot of therapists will recommend heat and cold for the most benefit. Start by applying cold several times a day to relieve inflammation. After two to three days, begin to apply heat to relax your muscles. Sometimes you may need to pair the hot and cold with a nonprescription pain reliever, but always consult your physician if you are taking other medications. If discomfort persists for more than a few days, see your doctor for further evaluation.
