We have a responsibility to spread the Word

Few of us are ever really tested in our faith. Many are blessed to live in communities where the freedom to practice our faith is taken for granted. For many, years of family tradition grounds them in our faith.

My father and mother were Catholic, as were their parents and generations that went back decades. It wasn't until college or our first experiences in the workforce that our thoughts and ideas about our religion were challenged. Sometimes it was professors in classes; other times it was fellow students or co-workers that we encountered who questioned our beliefs.

At those moments, we suddenly realized we were "on" for our faith. Not everyone in the world knows Jesus and his church. This is true, not only in foreign countries, but even in U.S. Society where the influence of secularism is growing. With this realization, some respond to the challenge by sharing what they know and others realize they need to learn more about the faith.

In any event, we cannot assume that everyone understands the Catholic faith and its teachings. I have noticed that those responsible for the faith have an appetite to learn more about the church and her teachings. The more we know about the church and understand her relationship to our salvation, the more we want to share it with others.

This idea of introducing people to Christ and his church was the motivating factor which compelled the missionaries to leave the comfort of their surroundings and set off to strange territories to present Christ and his church to peoples throughout the world.

Historically, many of the nations from which the ethnic and racial populations of the archdiocese came were evangelized by missionaries burning with the desire to share the faith. Of course, this has been the practice from the very beginning of the church herself. At the Ascension of



Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew (28:18-20), he gives the great commissioning: "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold I am with you always, until the end of the age."

This commissioning was meant for all disciples of the Lord. Blessed John Paul II stated in his encyclical "Redemptoris Missio" (the church's missionary mandate) 3.4 "God is opening before the church the horizons of a humanity more fully prepared for the sowing of the Gospel. I sense that the moment has come to commit all of the church's energies to a new evangelization and to the mission 'ad gentes' (to the nations). No believer in Christ, no institution of the church can avoid this supreme duty: to proclaim Christ to all peoples."


St. Paul would have been using every technological means possible to proclaim the message of Jesus. He would have agreed with Pope John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI viewing this moment as a new opportunity to use every means available to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus. There are men and women spreading the message of Jesus among the nations of the globe. However, we don't have to travel around the world as missionaries to fulfill our responsibility to spread the Word. It's imperative that we understand our obligation to do it, here and now. Just examine the statistics of how many people refer to themselves as Catholic yet never attend church on Sunday. We find

our churches half-filled. There is no excitement about Jesus or the church because they simply don't know Jesus and his church.

The new evangelization is an opportunity to bring the message of Jesus and his church to the people of our society who are living in a post-Christian era. These are our co-workers, our neighbors and even our family and friends. Evangelization is an interior conversion that affects not only the person, but the whole culture, resulting in a change of culture and institutions to make them more Christian. Therefore, there are three areas of evangelization:

- first, to proclaim the person of Christ to those who do not know the Lord;
- second, to proclaim the Lord to those who have been baptized but have grown lax or indifferent to Christ and his church; and
- third to continue the ongoing conversion in our own personal life deepening our relationship with Christ.

I want to increase our efforts of evangelization in the archdiocese. You have heard of my three priorities: Catholic identity, evangelization and stewardship. This Saturday, May 5, we will conduct an evangelization summit at the Cousins Center, bringing together parish representatives in order to begin a process of how best we can evangelize in our communities. We will discuss the meaning of new evangelization and the obligation we have as Catholics from our reception of baptism to proclaim the Lord to our brothers and sisters. In sharing sessions we will examine some of the practices and initiatives already in use by our parish staffs. Our "faith" is a cherished gift. Pope Benedict has declared the year of faith beginning on Oct. 11. Hopefully, our evangelization summit will assist us in understanding our obligation to spread the Gospel and produce in us zeal to spread the faith.

Calling all Prayer Shawl Ministry volunteers! I would like to meet with any/all parishioners who are part of our Prayer Shawl Ministry. For those of you who do not know about this ministry, here is a little bit of history about it. In 1998, Janet Bristow and Victoria Galo, two graduates of the 1997 Women's Leadership Institute at the Hartford Seminary in Hartford, CT gave birth to this ministry; along with their Professor Miriam Therese Winter, MMS. As told by Janet Bristow, “Shawls ... made for centuries universal and embracing, symbolic of an inclusive, unconditionally loving, God. They wrap, enfold, comfort, cover, give solace, mother, hug, shelter and beautify. Those who have received these shawls have been uplifted and affirmed, as if given wings to fly above their troubles ...”. Compassion and the love of knitting/crocheting have been combined into a prayerful ministry and spiritual practice which reaches out to those in need of comfort and solace, as well as in celebration and joy. Many blessings are prayed into every shawl. Whether they are called Prayer Shawls, Comfort Shawls or Peace Shawls, the shawl maker begins with prayers and blessings for the recipient. The intentions are continued throughout the creation of the shawl. Upon completion, a final blessing is offered before the shawl is sent on its way. Many recipients have continued the kindness by making a shawl and passing it onto someone in need. Thus, the blessing ripples from person-to-person, with both the giver and the receiver feeling the unconditional embrace of a sheltering, loving God! Shawls can be used for: undergoing medical procedures; as a comfort after a loss or in times of stress; during bereavement; prayer or meditation; commitment or marriage ceremonies; birthing, nursing a baby; bridal shower or wedding gift; during an illness and recovery; ministering to others; graduation, birthday, anniversary, ordination ... there are endless possibilities!

Economic Justice

Does the Church support a specific economic model?

The Church does not offer a specific economic model or technical solutions because different times call for different approaches. (John Paul II, *Centesimus annus (The Hundredth Year)* 43, Benedict XVI, *Caritas in veritate (Charity in Truth)* 9) Rather, she insists on the unconditional worth of every human being. The economy exists for the person, not the person for the economy.

The Church calls on us to use all our spiritual, moral, and intellectual energies to create a new order – “a society of free work, of enterprise and of participation. Such a society is not directed against the market, but demands that the market be appropriately controlled by the forces of society and by the State, so as to guarantee that the basic needs of the whole of society are satisfied.” (*Centesimus annus* 35)

What does the Church teach about economic rights?

“Catholic social teaching supports the right of workers to choose whether to organize, join a union, and bargain collectively, and to exercise these rights without reprisal. It also affirms economic freedom, initiative, and the right to private property.” (*FCFC* 76)

What can we do about poverty?

“A basic moral test for our society is how we treat the most vulnerable in our midst.” (*FCFC* 50)

For authentic human development and to address poverty, it is critical to create jobs with just wages and decent working conditions; to remove barriers to employment; and to provide access to health care, food, housing, and education. Public policies should reduce dependency by helping families living in poverty strengthen their families and find training, employment, and assistance with child care, housing, and transportation. A safety net and Social Security are needed for low- and average-wage individuals. (*FCFC* 76-84)

“Faith-based groups deserve recognition and support, not as a substitute for government, but as responsive, effective partners, especially in the poorest communities and countries.” (*FCFC* 78)

Why does consumerism worry the Church?

As Pope John Paul II has written, “It is not wrong to want to live better; what is wrong is a style of life which is presumed to be better when it is directed towards ‘having’ rather than ‘being’, and which wants to have more, not in order to be more but in order to spend life in enjoyment as an end in itself. It is therefore necessary to create life-styles in which the quest for truth, beauty, goodness and communion with others for the sake of common growth are the factors which determine consumer choices, savings and investments.” (*Centesimus annus* 36)

Workers and employers, entrepreneurs and unions – all have an indispensable role to play in creating humane and authentic development.

Fields of Hope and Dreams – Community Gardens

Who claimed Labor Day (i.e. last weekend) as the “unofficial” end of summer? It must have been school age kids, or some parents who send them off to school. But, the “official” end of summer and the start of fall is September 22nd two weeks from now at 9:49 a.m. That is the autumnal equinox or when day and night are each about 12 hours long (with the actual time of equal day and night, in the Northern Hemisphere, occurring a few days after the autumnal equinox). The sun crosses the celestial equator going southward; it rises exactly due east and sets exactly due west. This reduced sunlight for us, lowers temperatures and the cooler temperatures along with the reduced sunlight slows the growth and ripening process of some of our fruits and vegetables. Gardeners are limited in their outdoor successive planting because of this. Since most cool weather crop seeds need 45 - 60 days and a certain temperature, the selection of seeds for fall planting is reduced. So the next question gardener's ask is: When will we get our first frost? Estimates vary but for us, sometime around the second week of October (i.e. 10th – 15th). That leads to the following question of: When does day light savings time end or when do we set the clocks back? This year it is on November 4th. Whoa; didn't we just finish with the 90 degree temps and settle into those cool evenings, and now we're thinking about a frost. Our volunteer gardeners are always looking ahead.
