Beginning on the First Sunday of Advent you will notice that the tabernacle has been moved to the sanctuary in church. This move has been discussed and approved by the Parish Pastoral Council and the Parish Prayer and Worship Commission.

Moving the tabernacle from a side chapel or less prominent location to the center of the sanctuary emphasizes the central role of the Eucharist and promotes Eucharistic adoration, making the presence of Christ more visible and accessible to the faithful.

Here is a more detailed explanation:

• Emphasis on the Eucharist:

The tabernacle, which holds the consecrated Eucharist, is a symbol of Christ's presence. Moving it to the center of the sanctuary, a place of prominence, reinforces the belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

Promoting Prayer before the Eucharist:

When the tabernacle is in a prominent location, it encourages and allows people to spend time in prayer and contemplation before the Blessed Sacrament.

• Visible Presence:
